2.1 Curricular Aspects	
2.1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation	 The College follows curriculum prescribed by Pt Ravishankar University. However, w.ef. from Academic year 2016 -17 the Curriculum prescribed by Durg University is applicable. Academic Supervisory Committee monitors its implementation. Two teachers represented in the Academic Council of Pt Ravishankar University
2.1.2 Academic Flexibility	 2 PG courses in Languages,2 PG courses in Science and 5 PG courses in social sciences available. The college follows semester system in PG programmes and Annual system in UG programmes. The College introduced self financed programmes in Computer Application (B.Com), Computer Science (B.Sc), Economics and Sociology (M.A) and Geography (B.A).
2.1.3 Curriculum Enrichment	 Distinguished scholars have delivered 60 lectures. Co curricular activities conducted by the college for curriculum enrichment. Projects, Seminars and presentations in classrooms are organised to address cross cutting issues.

2.2 teaching-learning and evaluation	
2.2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile	 Admission process is publicised in website, news papers, prospectus and notice board of the college. Online admission system introduced w.e.f. 2016-17 Demand ratio of admission is high and increasing for both UG &PG. College follows the admission rules framed by affiliating University and Higher Education of CG Government.
2.2.2 Catering to Student Diversity	 The College organised programme for freshers and tutorial classes for students who are weak in English. Advanced learners are encouraged and honoured. Gender Sensitisation committee, Nodal officers for SC/ST/OBC and Women Development cell address gender, inclusion, environment etc issues.
2.2.3 Teaching-Learning Process	 The College follows academic calendar as provided by the University. Chalk and board method in teaching supplemented by seminars assignments, projects, workshops, educational trips in few departments, Business motivation center and English Language Lab promotes teaching learning process. ICT based teaching-learning initiated.

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2.2.4 Teacher Quality 2.2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms	 6 (Six) permanent teachers of which one having Ph.D. UGC funded 04 National seminars organised. One Teacher participated in Refresher course and another participated in Orientation courses. The College adheres to academic calendar of the University for conduct of examinations. 20% internal assessment for PG classes; tests, assignments and attendance are the criteria for allotting IA marks. Unit tests, half yearly tests, assignments are conducted for UG classes. 2.3.1 Promotion of Research	 No formal research committee. Two faculty members are Ph.D guides/Supervisors Permanent teachers attended 130 national seminars and 36 workshops
2.3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research	 One minor research project funded by UGC is in progress and 3 minor research projects completed. The College does not have separate budget for research activity.
2.3.3 Research Facilities	 Library books, and limited computer facilities available for undertaking research activity. No significant research facilities exist in the College.
2.3.4 Research Publications and Awards	 20 research articles published by 4 teachers in different journals of which 10 having ISBN. One teacher presented a research paper in the International Convention of Asia Scholars organised by Adelaide University Australia
2.3.5 Consultancy	Formal consultancy services yet to be undertaken.
2.3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility	 NSS and NCC actively engaged in worthy extension activities such as blood donation camp, tree plantation, Cleanliness programme, interaction with villagers in adopted village, socio economic survey etc. But NCC unit discontinued from 2014 due to shortage of permanent teachers. 1 NSS students participated in National integration camp and 5 participated in State level training camp. Both teachers and students participated in need based awareness programmes on social issues organised by the College.

2.4 Infrastructure and Learning Res	
2.4.1 Physical Facilities	 The College has 16.11 acres campus area and 1875 sq.m built up area. Class rooms, laboratory for science subjects, computer lab water coolers, seminar hall, parking facilities and canteer are available. Indoor and outdoor sports facilities along with limited Gym facility used by students. Common room and wash rooms available for girls' and boys. Construction of hostel for girls completed.
2.4.2 Library as a Learning Resource	 Library has 27560 books with 1360 titles and 23 journals along with a separate reading room and Book Bank. Automation facilities in the library initiated. Reading room facilities, internet and reprography exists. INFLIBNET E-Library facilities may be provided
2.4.3 IT Infrastructure	 Computer laboratory have 35 desktop/laptop computers with power backup. Limited Internet facility is available to faculty and students Wi- Fi. ,3 smart boards, CCTV installed.
2.4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities	 The College building is well maintained. Budgetary provisions have been made for maintenance of building and computer. Annual maintenance contract system available for sensitive equipments.
2.5 Student Support and Progression	
2.5.1 Student Mentoring and Support	 Prospectus of the Conege arthur beginning of academic session containing all relevant informations. Students availed scholarships by the State Government and medals are presented for meritorious students out of the cash endowments deposited by staff. Slow learners are given academic support.
2.5.2 Student Progression	 Progression of students in different programmes monitored informally. The pass percentage in UG and PG examinations is appreciable and a few students figured in University merit list. High drop out rate visible.

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- Need for extensive Short term self employment skill training courses such as tailoring and fashion designing, basic computer training, wealth out of waste, artificial flower making, beauty parlour training etc may be provided for girls.
- Need for augmenting sports facilities with coaching.
